Archeomagnetic Dating Research D. F. Griffiths is attempting to establish an archeomagnetic dating sequence in New York State for Middle and Late Modlands periods. This process can provide dates to within 15 years at a confidence level of 95% as compared to (-14's 100 years at a 67% confidence level. Pata collections entails casting fired clay in plaster of paris molds before the clay has been disturbed by excavation. This means that hearths and other strongly fired areas on soils with high clay content (and oxides of iron) are necessary to provide samples for analysis.
